BERLIN SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH

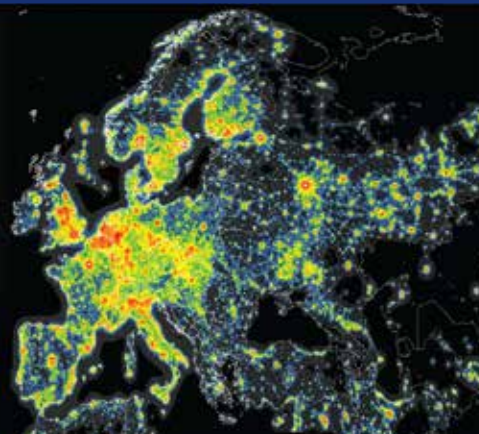

Additionally, the BSPH hosts executive (tuition fee based) degree programs in Epidemiology and third cycle doctoral degrees in Public Health can be earned at the TU Berlin (Dr. PH) and at the Charité (Dr. rer. med. and PhD in Health Data Sciences).

Public health research must develop new models for sustainable health system funding and create healthy living environments in an increasingly ageing, urbanized world. 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WELCOME TO BERLIN 2022

We are very pleased to welcome you to the 15th European Public Health Conference in Berlin.

It has been far too long since we have been able to shake a hand, share a cup of coffee, stumble upon an old colleague in the hallway or make a new friend just by serendipitously sitting in the back of a lecture hall. This year's conference will be the first EPH Conference since Marseille 2019 to take place live and in person. The spectacular Hub27 venue provides us with ample opportunities for exchanging knowledge and presenting research but also for informal chatting and live networking with friends and colleagues.

THEMES FOR BERLIN 2022

The theme of 15th EPH Conference is 'Strengthening health systems: improving population health and being prepared for the unexpected'. From the COVID-19 pandemic we have learned that infectious diseases know no boundaries. Although we have seen the successful development of vaccines, we have also that these vaccines have not yet been available to everyone. At the conference, we want to explore ways in which the public health community can rally around the principle of bringing about better population health for all. The growing health inequalities around the globe lead to a simple conclusion: Europe must take on a more active role in global health. This includes taking a stand on issues such as planetary health, climate change, environmental degradation, water and food security, migration, gender, and poverty. Europe must use its knowledge and influence to balance out market forces, expand regulatory oversight and create socially responsible systems for health, especially when it comes to the distribution of vaccines and essential medicines.

Digitalization is a key area where recent developments require us to exchange ideas and come up with new approaches. The past decades have seen significant developments in data collection and processing capacity as well as eHealth applications. We need to ensure that the vast amounts of data generated are well protected on the one hand, but also available and usable for public health interventions. We want

the discussions at the 15th EPH Conference to contribute to resilient health systems, universal health coverage (UHC), a well-trained and highly qualified clinical and public health workforce, and governance structures that take a stand and shape health systems globally.

These topics come back in our plenary programme, organized by our conference partners:

- Strengthening health systems in Europe: Opening session with Stella Kyriakides, European Commissioner for health and Food Safety; Karl Lauterbach, Minister of Health, Germany; Hans Kluge, WHO Regional Director for Europe
- Can people afford to pay for health care? How have countries re-designed health systems without leaving people behind?
- Benefits and challenges of the European Health Data Space (EHDS). The creation of the EHDS is one of the priorities of the European Union expecting to bring great benefits, but how to ensure transferability and privacy protection?
- Health systems performance assessment for policy: uses and abuses. How to benchmark and compare performance between European countries and how to measure resilience and prepare for future shocks.
- Reorienting health services: the transformational potential of health promotion. Health-promoting approaches as a vehicle for refocusing health services and strengthen integrated care and community oriented primary care.
- Sustaining high quality care: interprofessional training for our clinical and public health workforce. Providing a balanced view on public health and healthcare interprofessional relations and training needs.

With the help of our partners we offer you an exciting programme of workshops, oral and pitch presentations and poster walks. Our exhibitors are there to show you their latest publications, services and products. This all is taking place in Berlin, a city full of history and multicultural diversity, giving you the possibility to meet your colleagues from Europe and across the globe.

PLENARY SPEAKERS



Reinhard Busse – Chair of the 15th European Public Health Conference

and Head of the Department Health care management, Technische Universität Berlin, Germany

Head of the Department Health care management in the Faculty of Economics and Management at Technische Universität Berlin, Germany. He is also Co-Director of the European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies. His research focuses on methods and contents of comparative health system analysis and performance assessment, health services research (with emphasis on hospitals, human resources, financing and payment mechanisms), health economics and health technology assessment (HTA). He is editor-in-chief of Health Policy (since 2011) and director of the Federal Ministry of Research-funded Berlin Centre of Health Economics Research (since 2012). He was speaker of the board of the inter-university Berlin School of Public Health (2015-2018), President of the German Health Economics Association (2016/17) and member of the Government Commission for Modern and Needs-based Hospital Care (since 2022). His department is supporting the School of Public Health in Kumasi, Ghana, in setting up a master's program in Health Systems' Research and Management.



Verena Vogt – Chair of the EPH Conference International Scientific Committee

and Junior Professor for Health care services research, Technische Universität Berlin, Germany

Junior Professor for Health care services research and quality management in the ambulatory care sector in the Faculty of Economics and Management at Technische Universität Berlin, Germany. In 2017, she was a visiting scholar at the Menzies Centre for Health Policy (MCHP), University of Sydney. Before her appointment as junior professor, Verena was a research fellow at the Berlin University of Technology's Department of Health Care Management and the Berlin Centre of Health Economics Research (BerlinHECOR). Her research activities focus on identifying practice-based care pathways and measuring low-value care in German routine data. In addition, she is exploring causes and effects of regional variation and social inequalities in health and health care and involved in evaluating innovative care projects for persons with multi-morbidity. In addition to her research activities, Verena is involved in teaching core modules at master levels in Public Health.



Petronille Bogaert – President EUPHA–Public health monitoring and reporting section, and head EU health information systems, Sciensano, Belgium

Project researcher and head of unit EU health information systems at Sciensano, Belgium. Her work primarily focusses on European research projects in the area of population health information. She is coordinating the Population Health Information Research Infrastructure for COVID-19 which aims to strengthen the exchange of COVID-19 health information with 41 partners in 30 countries. Other European projects she is involved in include the Joint Action Towards the European Health Data Space and Healthy Cloud. She is a graduate from a double European Master of Public Health. She also holds a Bachelor's and Master's in Biomedical Sciences and is PhD candidate at Tilburg University, The Netherlands. She is president of the EUPHA Public health monitoring and reporting section and she is a member of the ESCAIDE Scientific Committee.



Jet Bussemaker – Chair Council of Public Health & Society, Netherlands, and Leiden University Medical Center, Leiden, Netherlands

Jet Bussemaker is chair of the Council for Public Health & Society (RVS) since June 2019. Since 2018, she has been working as professor of 'Science, policy and social impact, in particular in health care' at the Leiden University Medical Center, Leiden University, Netherlands. Between 2012 and 2017 she was Minister of Education, Culture and Science and Dean of the Amsterdam University of Applied Sciences from 2011 until 2012. She was Secretary of State for the ministry of Health, Welfare and Sports from 2007 until 2010. Previous positions included: Member of Parliament for the Labour Party (PvdA) and assistant professor at the VU University, Amsterdam, Netherlands. She graduated cum laude in political science and obtained his doctorate at the University of Amsterdam, Netherlands, for the dissertation 'Contested Independent. Individualization, gender and the welfare state' (awarded the 1994 Political Science Prize).



Caroline Costongs – Director EuroHealthNet

Director of EuroHealthNet, a European Partnership for improving health, equity and wellbeing, based in Brussels. Caroline has an MSc in Public Health from the University of Maastricht (The Netherlands) and her main work focuses on policy, advocacy, research and capacity building in the field of health inequalities, health promotion across the life course, sustainable development and "Health in all Policies". She is a Board member of APHEA (Public Health Accreditation Agency) and member of the International Council for the European Public Health Conference. Caroline has also worked at the Netherlands Olympic Committee and Sports Confederation (NOC*NSF) on physical activity promotion for young people. Before that, she was active at the Health Institute of the Liverpool John Moores University where she did research on healthy public policies in cities and at the National Capacity Building Institute (INICE) of the Honduras Ministry of Education.



Tara Chen – Climate-Health Fellow, Association of Schools of Public Health in the European Region (ASPHER)

Tara Chen is a young public health professional working to strengthen health systems with a vision that "everything & everywhere is public health". She holds a BHSc from Western University, Canada, and a dual Masters of Public Health (Europubhealth+) in Governance and Health Economics. She is currently a PhD Student in the Department of Geography & Environmental Management, University of Waterloo, Canada, under the Geographies of Health in Place (GoHeIP) lab. For the last 6 years, she has been exploring health systems abroad, with her most recent experience in Taiwan. She has an active interest in health systems, SDGs, planetary health, health literacy and cross-sectoral collaborations. Tara is currently a Climate-Health Fellow with the Association of Schools of Public Health in the European Region, working on advocating for climate-health competencies in public health curriculum. Tara is also a strong advocate for amplifying young voices in dialogue, research and practice.



Martin Dietrich – Acting Director Federal Center for Health Education (BZgA), Germany

Prof. Dr. Martin Dietrich has been Acting Director of the Federal Centre for Health Education (BZgA) since February 2021. Before becoming Acting Director, he headed several BZgA departments: 'Support for Health Promotion and Prevention by the Statutory Health Insurance Funds in Various Settings' and 'Overall Planning, Coordination and Control, Central Project and Quality Management, Task Force'. Since mid-2020, he has also been responsible for communication methods and new media in health education. In 2011, Martin Dietrich took up a professorship in Business Administration, with a specialisation in Health Services Management Research at Saarland University, Germany. His academic focus was on innovation and health services development. After moving to BZgA, he was appointed honorary professor at Saarland University in 2017. As an academic, Martin Dietrich has worked with methods of quantitative and qualitative empirical social research on behavioural and social science approaches in health services management.



Christian Drosten – Director, Institute of Virology, Charité Universitätsmedizin Berlin, Germany

Christian Drosten is Head of Administrative Office for Global Health and Director Institute of Virology at the Charité Universitätsmedizin Berlin, Germany. His research focuses on novel and emergent viruses. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Drosten came to national prominence as an expert on the implications and actions required to combat the illness in Germany. He studied Medicine at the Johann Wolfgang Goethe University, Frankfurt am Main, Germany. He did his doctorate at the Institute for transfusion medicine of the German Red Cross (DRK) blood donation service. From 2007, Drosten headed the Institute of Virology at University Hospital Bonn, Germany. Since 2017, he heads the Institute of Virology at the Charité in Berlin. Drosten is committed to the transparent distribution of scientific data and therefore, publishes in specialist journals such as Eurosurveillance, where all articles are freely available online.

PLENARY SPEAKERS



Tamás Evetovits – Head of Office, WHO Barcelona Office for Health Systems Financing

Dr. Tamás Evetovits is the Head of the WHO Barcelona Office for Health Systems Financing. He is leading WHO's technical assistance to Member States on health financing in the European Region. A key part of his work is on monitoring financial protection in European health systems and improving coverage policies to reduce financial hardship and unmet need. He has extensive experience in training and consultancy in health financing policy and capacity building in countries of Central and Eastern Europe. He is a medical doctor by training and holds two MSc degrees in health policy and management from Semmelweis University (Budapest) and the University of London.



Cristiano Figueiredo – Family doctor and trainer family medicine, USF de Baixa, National Health Service, Portugal

Family doctor and also works as trainer and adviser in General and Family Medicine at the USF da Baixa, Central Lisbon Health Centre Cluster, National Health Service in Portugal. He is the co-founder and co-coordinator of the NOVA PSOA - Social Prescribing Implementation and Evaluation Research Group - at the National School of Public Health, NOVA University Lisbon in Portugal. In addition, he coordinates two other innovative community health projects: Bengalisboa Community Health Project and Walk with a Dog Lisbon. He is a PhD Candidate and invited assistant at the National School of Public Health, NOVA University Lisbon, Portugal.



Kenneth Grech – Co-chair EU Expert Group Health Systems Performance Assessment, and Ministry of Health, Malta

Qualified as a medical doctor from the University of Malta in 1991 and received specialist training in Public Health Medicine. He read for a Master's degree in Public Health from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, a Master's in Business Administration from the University of Malta and a PhD in health system performance and health policy development from Warwick University, United Kingdom. He is also a Fellow of the Faculty of Public Health, United Kingdom. He occupied several senior management and policy positions in Malta and Europe, including that of Chief Executive Officer of St Luke's Hospital and Permanent Secretary of the Ministry for Health in Malta. He served as Treasurer of the European Public Health Association (EUPHA) and is currently the Co-chair of the EU Expert Group on Health System Performance Assessment. He is working as a Consultant in Public health medicine with the Department of Health in Malta and was responsible for the COVID-19 Public Health Response Team in Malta. He has published in the fields of health services management and leadership, public health and policy, training and education.



Kaisa Immonen – Director of Policy European Patients' Forum (EPF)

Kaisa Immonen, MA, is Director of Policy at the European Patients' Forum (EPF). She has Masters degrees in Health Policy and International Relations. She leads EPF's policy and advocacy team, provides strategic advice and policy analysis, and maintains high-level relationships with EU and international organisations and stakeholders. She was the co-chair of the European Medicines Agency's Patients and Consumers Working Party in 2016-2022 and participated in the EMA's COVID-19 task force in 2020-22. She represents EPF on the OECD's Health Care Quality and Outcomes working party, the International advisory group for the OECD PaRIS initiatives, and the CIOMS working group XI on patient involvement. In her personal capacity she is a member of The BMJ Patient Panel. Her personal interests include patient and citizen participation in healthcare improvement, patient safety, and health literacy.



Hans Kluge – WHO Regional Director for Europe

WHO Regional Director for Europe since 1 February 2020. Dr Hans Kluge has been active in public health for more than 25 years. He started his career as a family doctor in Belgium and served for Médecins Sans Frontières in Liberia and Somalia. He worked on large-scale tuberculosis programmes in prison systems in Siberia and several countries of the former Soviet Union. At the WHO Regional Office for South-East Asia, he was responsible for tuberculosis, AIDS and malaria programmes in the Democratic People's Republic of Korea and Myanmar. In 2009, he moved to the WHO Regional Office for Europe. As Director of the Division of Health Systems and Public Health he was engaged in largescale transformations of health systems; studies on universal health coverage and financial protection; prioritized a focus on service delivery including integrated and primary health care; and built strong partnerships on health system performance and reforms with global and European health organisations, civil society and donors.



Ruediger Krech – Director for Health Promotion, World Health Organization (WHO)

Dr Ruediger Krech is the Director for Health Promotion at the World Health Organization. He leads WHO's work on tobacco and alcohol control, physical activity and enhanced wellbeing; and the programs on public health law and fiscal policies for health. He has previously been directing the work on health systems and universal health coverage, and he has been instrumental in developing the public health work on social determinants of health. Before joining WHO, he was leading Germany's development work on social protection. His distinguished career is guided by his vision for the role of global health in societal development.



Stella Kyriakides – European Commissioner for Health and Food Safety

European Commissioner for Health and Food Safety since 2019. As Commissioner, she has been responsible for launching Europe's Beating Cancer Plan to help improve cancer prevention and care and exploring ways to ensure Europe has enough affordable medicines to meet its needs. She is also responsible for creating the creating a European Health Data Space to promote health-data exchange and support research, ensuring citizens have control over their own personal data. Before becoming Commissioner, she served as the first Cypriot national and third woman President of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe. From 2006 to 2019 she was a member of the House of Representatives of the Republic of Cyprus. In addition to her parliamentary activities, she was appointed president of the First Breast Cancer Movement in Cyprus in 1999. From 2004 until 2006, she served as President of the European Breast Cancer Coalition Europa Donna. In 2016, she was appointed President of the National Committee on Cancer Strategy of the Council of Europe. Stella Kyriakides received a degree in psychology at the University of Reading, United Kingdom and a master's degree in child maladjustment from the University of Manchester, United Kingdom.



Karl Lauterbach – Federal Minister of Health, Germany

Federal Minister of Health of Germany since December 2021. Before becoming minister he has been a Member of the Deutsche Bundestag for the Social Democratic Party (SPD) since 2005. He was deputy chairman of the SPD parliamentary group and speaker for consumer protection. He studied Medicine in Aachen and Dusseldorf, Germany, and received his first doctoral degree at the Institute of Nuclear Medicine in Jülich, Germany. He studied health policy and management and epidemiology as a post-doc at the Harvard School of Public Health, Boston, USA, and received a degree as a Doctor of Science in Health Policy and Management. His expertise covers a wide range of topics in health policy, including cost effectiveness research, evidence based medicine and quality research. His expertise has helped to strengthen the evidence base of health policy decisions within the German public health insurance system. As a leading law maker, he was involved in more than 80 health care laws. He is author of more than 100 scientific articles in peer-reviewed international journals in the field of health economics and health policy.

PLENARY SPEAKERS



Jan De Maeseneer – Chair European Commission Expert Panel on Effective Ways of Investing in Health, and Department of Public Health and Primary Care, Ghent University, Belgium

Professor Emeritus at Department of Public Health and Primary Care, Ghent University, Belgium, and Chair of the European Commission Expert Panel on Effective Ways of Investing in Health. He worked from 1978 until 2017 as a family physician in the inter-professional Community Health Center Botermarkt-Ledeberg, a deprived and multicultural area in Ghent, Belgium. He has been Head of the Department of Public Health and Primary Care at Ghent University from 1991 until 2017. He was a founding member of the European Forum for Primary Care (EFPC) and served EFPC in various capacities for many years. He is a member of the Board of Primafamed, a network focusing on capacity building for human resources for primary health care in Africa. Since 2019, he is an International Member of the National Academy of Medicine, Washington, USA. His main interests are access to health care; primary care; quality of care; human resources for health care; financing mechanisms.



Isabel de la Mata – Principal Adviser for Health and Crisis Management, European Commission

Principal Adviser for Health and Crisis Management in the European Commission. Previously, she worked as Counsellor for Health and Consumers at the Permanent Representation of Spain to the EU, as Deputy Director General for Health Planning at the Spanish Ministry of Health, as Adviser to the Vice-minister of Health and several other posts at the Ministry of Health of Spain and the Regional Departments in the Basque Country and in Madrid. In addition, she has been a member of the EURO-WHO Standing Committee of the Regional Committee, and has worked with the Pan American Health Organisation, the Inter-American Development Bank and the Spanish Agency for International Cooperation. Isabel de la Mata graduated in Medicine and Surgery by the University of Basque Country in 1983 and holds post-graduate degrees from the University of Leuven and Paris VI in Public Health, Hospital Administration and Statistics. She is a specialist in Preventive Medicine and Public Health.



Susan Michie – Director of the Centre for Behaviour Change, University College London, United Kingdom

Professor of Health Psychology and Director of the Centre for Behaviour Change at University College London, United Kingdom. Her research focuses on human behaviour change in relation to health and the environment: how to understand it theoretically and apply theory and evidence to intervention and policy development, evaluation and implementation. Her research, collaborating with disciplines such as information science, environmental science, computer science and medicine, covers population, organisational and individual level interventions. She is an investigator on more than 15 research projects, including three addressing behaviour and the Covid-19 pandemic. She has published over 500 journal articles and several books. She serves as an expert advisor on the UK's Scientific Pandemic Insights Group on Behavioural Science (Covid-19), the Lancet's Covid-19 Commission and as a member of the UK's Independent SAGE. She serves on WHO's Behavioural Insights and Sciences Technical Advisory Group, and is part of NIHR's Behavioural Science Policy Research Unit, and chaired the Academy of Social Science's 'Health of People' project.



John Middleton – President ASPHER

President of the Association of Schools of Public Health in the European Region (ASPHER). He was Director of Public Health for Sandwell in the West Midlands of England for 27 years; until he retired in 2014, he was the longest serving Director of Public Health in England. He was awarded Fellowship of the Royal College of Physicians in September 2015. He lives in Coventry in the West Midlands. He has interests in environmental health, sustainable development and violence prevention.



Natasha Azzopardi Muscat – Director of the Division of Country Health Policies and Systems, WHO Regional Office for Europe

Medical doctor, a specialist in public health. Following her qualification as a medical doctor from the University of Malta in 1995, she worked in various areas in the health sector in Malta, including maternal and child health, mental health, and primary care. Her transdisciplinary research bridging health policy, European studies and small states studies led to her PhD entitled "The Europeanisation of health systems: a small state perspective". Since 1999, she has been a resident academic at the University of Malta, teaching in the department of health services management and public health. In 2003, she obtained her membership in the Faculty of Public Health of the United Kingdom. Between 2001 and 2013, she occupied various senior positions in the Ministry of Health in Malta, including that of Chief Medical Officer. Before joining WHO, she served as President of the European Public Health Association (EUPHA) from 2016 to 2020, where she was actively involved in health advocacy at the European level.

His main current research interests are on health care finance and the economics of ageing and palliative and end of life care. He has worked on a range of studies on economic and health economic aspects of ageing in Ireland. He has collaborated for many years with WHO and with the European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies and is currently co-leading a programme of work on population ageing and the impact on health and social care. He recently co-authored the Observatory's policy brief on end of life care and the forthcoming brief on ageing and health care finance for the Western Pacific Regional Office.

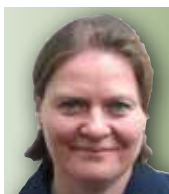
Dimitra Panteli – European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies

She leads the Observatory's pillar of work on Innovation and supports its knowledge brokering programme in evidence briefings, webinars and policy dialogues. Her core interests revolve around evidence-informed health policy and health care in Europe, particularly regarding quality of care, coverage and access. Before joining the Observatory, Dimitra worked as a senior research fellow at the Department of Health Care Management at Technische Universität Berlin, Germany, a role she held for more than 10 years. She holds a doctorate in public health from the Technische Universität Berlin, a Masters in Science – Public Health from the Charité Medical University in Berlin and a Medical Degree from the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki in Greece. She spent the 2016–17 academic year as a Commonwealth Fund Harkness Fellow in Washington, DC.



Irene Papanicolas, Professor of Health Services Policy and Practice, Brown School of Public Health, USA

Irene Papanicolas, health economist and health services researcher, has recently joined the School of Public Health, Brown University, Rhode Island, USA as a Professor of Health Services Policy and Practice. Irene's research is focused on assessing the performance of health systems and furthering the use of health system comparisons to draw insights for national policy makers. Irene co-leads the International Collaborative on Costs, Outcomes and Needs in Care (ICCONIC), funded by the Commonwealth Fund and the Health Foundation. The ICCONIC Collaborative consists of 12 partners from across North America, Europe and the Pacific who work together to understand patterns of health service utilization, costs and outcomes for a clinically diverse group of high-need, high-cost patients. Irene has published in peer-reviewed journals, edited volumes and contributed to numerous book chapters around the measurement of health system performance and the assessment of health systems, published by Cambridge University Press, Open University Press. Senior Health Financing Specialist at the WHO Barcelona Office for Health Systems Financing, where she leads a multi-country study looking at whether people in Europe can afford to pay for health care. Before moving to Barcelona in 2013, Sarah was Associate Professor in Health Policy at the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE), Deputy Director of LSE Health and Head of the LSE Hub of the European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies. From 2013 to 2016, Sarah was a member of the European Commission's Expert Panel on Effective Ways of Investing in Health.



George Valiotis – Executive Director European Health Management Association (EHMA)

George Valiotis is the Executive Director of EHMA. He represents the voice of health management to many European and international bodies including the European Parliament, the European Commission, the World Health Organization, industry bodies, and community groups. George chairs EHMA's webinar series, guides the coordination of the annual conference and has an active role in all EHMA's projects by providing high-level advice on health management matters. Prior to joining EHMA, George was the Chief Executive Officer of a Scottish policy agency focusing on blood-borne viruses and sexual infections. He has managed multiple strategic policy and education collaborations with diverse stakeholder, worked as an education specialist for the International AIDS Society, served on the Board of Diabetes Australia and as an Advisor on its Medical Education and Policies Council and as Principal Strategic Advisory to the Commissioner for Children and Young People, Scotland.



Dineke Zeegers Paget – Strategic adviser European Public Health Association (EUPHA)

Dineke Zeegers Paget is the Strategic adviser of EUPHA – the European Public Health Association – a network of national public health associations aimed at voicing knowledge and capacity building. Dineke has a law degree, followed by a PhD on comparing AIDS legislation in the world (1996). She worked at the World Health Organization HQ (1988-1990) and the University of Groningen (1990-1992) where she worked on legal issues and human rights related to AIDS. Between 1992 and 2000, she worked at the Swiss Federal Ministry of Public Health, as a coordinator of AIDS projects for specific target groups and health promotion in prisons. Dineke was the EUPHA Executive Director for 25 years and stepped down in July 2022.

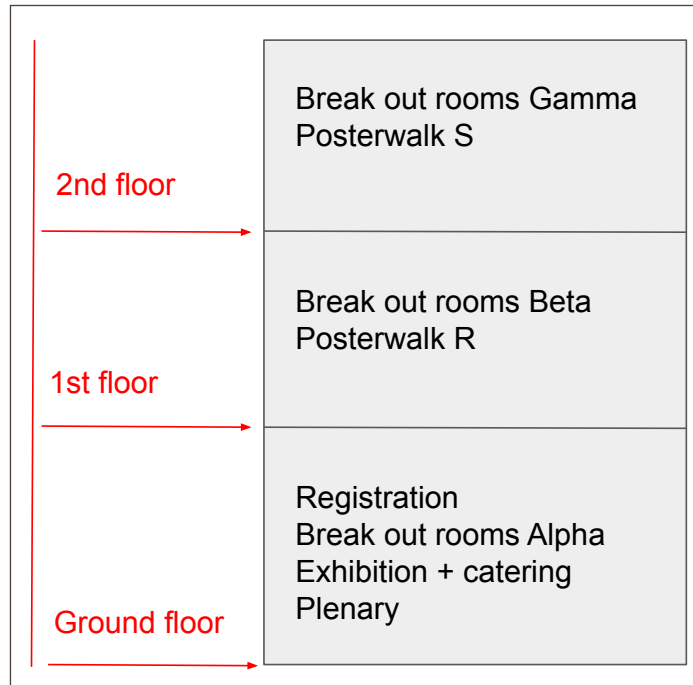

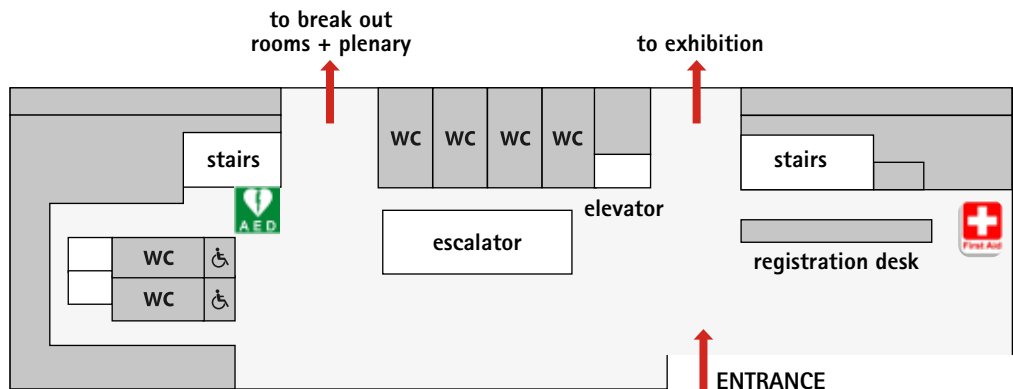

FLOOR PLAN

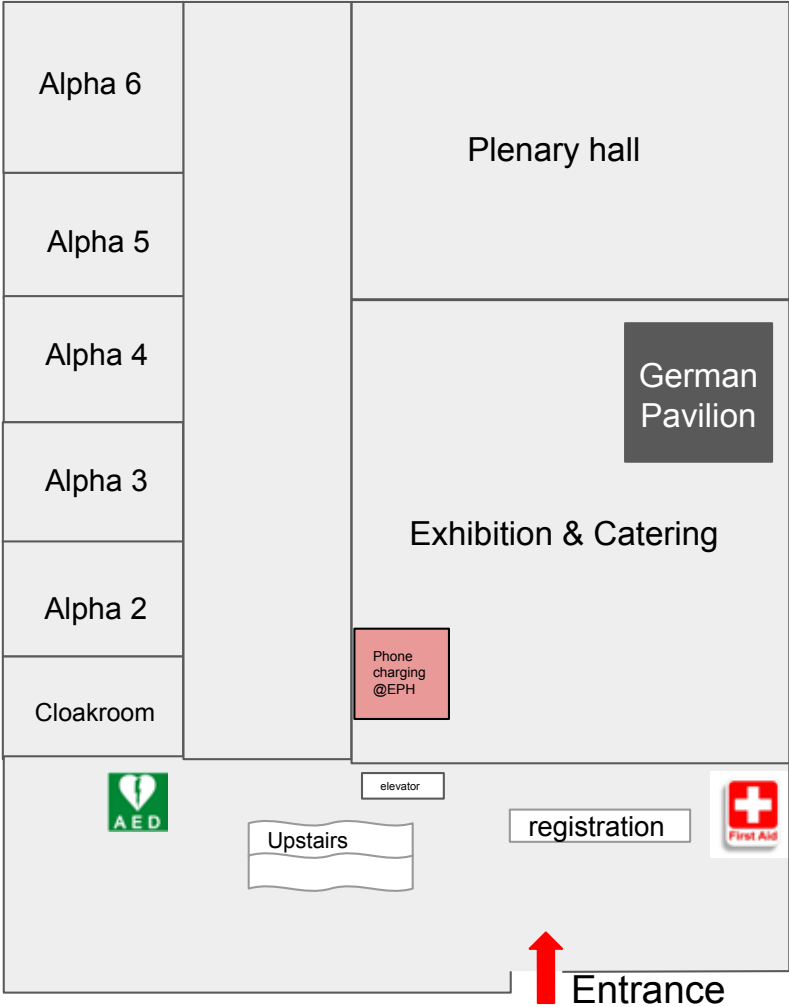
OVERVIEW VENUE
